

## Dr. Who Scarf Knock-Off Scarf Pattern For Bulky Knitting Machine

Adapted by Glenda Clemens 2013. Feel free to use and adapt to your own needs however you would like.

**NOTES:** I have an SK 155 and SR 155. I made these scarves for my 6'3" son, his 5'2" wife and 3 year-old daughter. Because of the differences in their sizes I made the widths different and further adapted the woman's and child's scarf to be not so long for safety reasons. The yarn quantities are for all three scarves.

Yarn: Vanna's Choice or other worsted weight yarn of your choice.

Colors:	Number of Skeins: (for all three scarves)
Beige 123	8
Olive 174	8
Charcoal 151	4
Brick 133	4
Toffee 124	4
Burgundy 148	8
Mustard 158	4

Gauge isn't important but man's scarf was about 12 inches wide and 10-12 feet long. I found that 20 *circular* rows was about 2 inches. Using both ribber and knitting machine set up for full needle rib knitting with knitting and ribbing tension gauge at 6 and tension mast at 5 for circular knitting. Edge stitches of scarf should be on knitting board not ribber.

### Set Up and Ideas and Thoughts:

1. With ribber dial and knitter dials set to "R" (or your machine's ribber cast on setting) do circular cast on with Burgundy using ribber cast on comb with weights (I used 3 weights on Man's and Woman's and 2 on Child's).
2. Change stitch tension dials to 6 on both ribber and knitter. Reset row counter (RC) to zero (0) after cast on is complete and at each color change unless you want to count every section in your head.
3. Yarn changes: I held the old color end with the new color end below the knitting/ribber boards and knitted one row of new color. Then I used square knot to tie the yarns together (this is the knot used in the magic knot join) and tucked the yarn ends inside the work. This left no noticeable bump and should hold well. Use whatever method you like or leave to finish after scarf is completed. I needed and used the break in the knitting to do this. 😊
4. I printed out the pattern (next page) and used check marks in each box to keep track of where I was on the pattern.
5. If you want your scarves longer or shorter simply change the number of rows in the colors but do not make them all the same. The uniqueness of the scarf is the varied depth of each color. If you want your scarf wider, cast on more stitches.
6. This pattern is adapted from <http://wittylittleknitter.com/wp-content/uploads/2011/04/Vannas-Choice-Season-12.png> which is the hand-knitted version of this pattern. Feel free to continue to adapt as fits your needs and desires. I like it the way I've done it...you should do your way and consider this your starting point.
7. I found the green yarn was the one most likely to drop stitches and on the knitter board side, not ribber board side. Very frustrating. I finally just put a plastic safety pin in dropped stitches and wove them in at the end of making the scarf. They disappeared and were not visible and yet safely tucked up.

Move stitches from ribber to knitter board using your double end eye needle. Bind off with your preferred method; block if desired/needed.

### **FINISHING:**

On all scarves add fringe scarves with tassels made from 12 inch long sections of all seven colors. Combine one section of each of the colors for each fringe. On the man's scarf there should be 12 fringes each end, woman's scarf I used 10 fringes on each end and on the child's eight fringes on each end.

If you want it to look like the original which was knit in garter stitch you can turn inside out and fish the yarn ends through from the purl side (which is now inside out) and tie them off inside the scarf. I did **not** do this. I liked the look at it is recognizable as what it is. . . a knock off of the Dr. Who Scarf.

**Man's Scarf is about 11-12 feet long**

**Woman's Scarf is about 8-10 feet long**

**Child's Scarf is about 6-8 feet long**
